TEA-SCENTED ROSES.

A rich, warm, dry soil is necessary to grow them to perfection; and where the soil is not naturally dry the beds must be well drained previous to being prepared. Moderate and not too close pruning is best, the weak and unripe wood being entirely removed. This operation should not be performed before quite the end of March or beginning of April, as the early growth is often killed by the late Spring frosts.

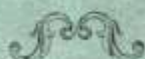
