# Vegetable Seeds.

All Seeds offered in this Catalogue have been tested in accordance with the provisions of the Seeds Act, 1920.  
Germination and purity are not less than the minimum percentages authorised by the Seeds Regulations.

## GARDEN PEAS.

Peas do well in any good garden soil, but thrive best in ground deeply trenched and manured for a previous crop. Sow about an inch and a half deep, in double rows 6 or 8 inches apart, with stakes between the rows for support. It is also a good plan to sow in trenches wide apart, with some other crop between. By this means both sides of the rows get the full advantage of light and air, while the trenches are convenient for watering in dry seasons. Sow early sorts in February, and again towards the end of the month for succession. The first week in March a general sowing should be made of the second early and main-crop varieties, and continued once a fortnight till the beginning of July.

## CUCUMBER.

A temperature of 70 to 75 degrees, with a minimum of 60 degrees, should be maintained, and the walls and passages kept moist. When the weather is warm give plenty of air, and syringe morning and evening. Cucumbers are generally grown in span-roofed houses, which are specially suitable for their culture; but where stable litter is plentiful, a good supply may be had by growing them on hotbeds in pits or frames.

For early crops sow in January and again in February and March for succession.
